Origin

While its earliest years trace back to the *Philadelphia Festival of World Cinema* at Penn's Annenberg Center, SIP officially came under the Greater Philadelphia Film Office's wing in 2002 through Joan Bressler and Brian Wade, shortly after the launch of our "Filmmakers" Program.

Who?

Open to all screenwriters, world-wide, who submit a feature length screenplay OR an original TV pilot length screenplay that can be shot in the Greater Philadelphia Metropolitan Area.

Writers do **NOT** need to be from Philadelphia, and scripts do NOT need to be explicitly set in Philadelphia. They must simply be **feasible to shoot in the Philadelphia region** (including surrounding counties).

HISTORY

The Set in Philadelphia (SIP) Screenwriting Competition has long been a celebration of emerging voices in film and television. While its earliest years trace back to the Philadelphia Festival of World Cinema at Penn's Annenberg Center, SIP officially came under the Greater Philadelphia Film Office's wing in 2002 through Joan Bressler and Brian Wade, shortly after the launch of our "Filmmakers" Program. From the beginning, SIP was built on the dedication of talented readers, judges, and sponsors who believed in nurturing new storytellers.

In its early years, SIP offered both a Grand Prize and the Irene I. Parisi Award, established by acclaimed screenwriter Stephen Rivele in honor of his mother, recognizing a writer under 21. Over the years, additional prizes expanded the competition's reach — including a Student Prize, a Regional Prize, the Prime Time TV Prize, the Oscar Micheaux Award (for writers of the African Diaspora), and the Nina Lo Presti Award (for female writers).

HISTORY

continued

SIP has consistently opened doors for writers — connecting them with industry professionals, mentors, and judges who often champion their work beyond the competition. Many applicants credit SIP with helping launch their careers through advice, opportunities, and exposure.

SIP has thrived because of the generosity of sponsors, the insight of judges, and the dedication of volunteer readers who bring passion and expertise to the process. That spirit of collaboration and opportunity continues to make SIP one of the region's most valued platforms for screenwriters.

In 2025, GPFO changed the screenwriting competition title to **The Joan Bressler Set in Philadelphia Screenwriting Competition** in honor of its co-founder for her 30 year commitment to the contest and film industry in Philadelphia.

The Grand Prize - Feature Length Screenplay

The Grand Prize is the competition's highest honor, recognizing the most outstanding screenplay across all categories.

- > Should be half-hour or one-hour.
- > Single-camera pilots.
- ➤ Under 70 pages in length.
- > Written in standard screenplay format.

The Oscar Micheaux Award for a Regional Screenwriter of the African Diaspora, Sponsored by VestedIn

Named in honor of pioneering filmmaker and novelist Oscar Micheaux, this award celebrates the creative contributions of the African Diaspora to screenwriting. By highlighting stories rooted in the African Diaspora experience, the prize continues Micheaux's legacy of challenging conventions and amplifying underrepresented perspectives in cinema.

The winner will receive:

\$2,500 Cash Award – presented to the writer whose work demonstrates exceptional creativity, storytelling, originality, and has strong potential for recognition within the industry.

Recognition & Prestige – the winning screenplay will be showcased as the overall competition winner in this category, highlighted in official announcements, and on the GPFO website.

➤ This is a regional prize. Applicants must provide a signed Micheaux eligibility form. Proof of residency in Philadelphia, Bucks, Chester, Delaware, or Montgomery County (legible copy of driver's license, deed, or passport). Co-authors must meet the same requirements.

Nina Lo Presti Award for a Female Screenwriter, Sponsored by Laurie Lo Presti

Nina Lo Presti Award for a Female Screenwriter for women-identified and nonbinary screenwriters, ideally with a connection to the Philadelphia region (resided, worked, matriculated, etc.). Made possible by Lo Presti's daughter, Laurie Lo Presti.

The winner will receive:

\$1,500 Cash Award – presented to the writer whose work demonstrates exceptional creativity, storytelling, originality, and has strong potential for recognition within the industry.

Recognition & Prestige – the winning screenplay will be showcased as the overall competition winner in this category, highlighted in official announcements, and on the GPFO website.

A multi-prized screenwriting competition for feature-length or TV pilot scripts that could be filmed in the Greater Philadelphia region.

Writers do NOT need to be from Philadelphia, and scripts do NOT need to be explicitly set in Philadelphia. They must simply be feasible to shoot in the Philadelphia region (including surrounding counties).

1. Eligibility & General Requirements

- 1. Screenplay must be able to be produced in the Philadelphia region (including surrounding counties).
 - Scripts will be judged on their overall quality and the extent to which they project "shootability" in the Greater Philadelphia region.
- 2. All genres will be accepted.
 - All genres and storytelling approaches are acceptable unless otherwise specified by Prize requirements.
- 3. You may submit multiple feature-length or TV pilot scripts; however, **only one entry per application is permitted.** Each submission requires a separate entry form and fee.
- 4. Screenplays that are currently in production are ineligible.
- 5. If there is more than one writer, **each must sign the release form** for the application to be accepted.
- 6. Judges' decisions are final and binding.

2. Submission Deadlines & Fees con't

- 1. Submissions must be electronically time-stamped by the stated deadlines. Late entries will not be accepted.
- 2. Submission fees are non-refundable, regardless of disqualification, withdrawal, or non-selection.
- 3. Electronic submissions only.
- 4. Submissions will be processed through the FilmFreeway platform, which will prompt you to include all relevant documents and payment.
- 5.By submitting, you authorize us to use any trusted third-party online and cloud-based services and databases for hosting, managing, and/or transmitting your submission files.



3. Formatting Requirements

Title Page:

- A title page with only the title must accompany the screenplay.
- No author identification may appear on the title page.
- Scripts will be numbered for confidentiality.

Must be between 85–130 pages in length.

3. Formatting Requirements con't

Artificial Intelligence (AI) Policy:

Purpose & Disqualification: Set in place to protect the integrity of the competition. The use of Al in any part of the creative process will result in immediate disqualification.

Human Authorship Only: All submissions must be created solely by the entrant(s). Submissions generated in whole or in part by artificial intelligence (Al) tools, including but not limited to ChatGPT, Claude, Gemini, or similar systems, are not permitted.

Certification of Originality: By entering the Competition, applicants certify that their submission is entirely their original human-authored work and free of Al-generated content.

Investigation and Enforcement: The Competition reserves the right, at its sole discretion, to request verification of authorship and to disqualify any submission suspected of Al involvement.

Intellectual Property Responsibility: Entrants remain fully responsible for the originality and authenticity of their work. The Competition will not be liable for disputes arising from the submission of Al-generated material.

4. Prize-Specific Eligibility

The Nina Lo Presti Award:

Female screenwriters, ideally with a connection to the Philadelphia region (resided, worked, matriculated, etc.). Both features and TV pilots are eligible.

The Content for Kids Prize:

Writers with a connection to the Philadelphia region (resided, worked, matriculated, etc.) who submit content appropriate for audiences aged 12 and under.

Both features and TV pilots are eligible.

The Oscar Micheaux Award:

Applicants must provide a signed Micheaux eligibility form.

Regional award. Proof of residency in Philadelphia, Bucks, Chester, Delaware, or Montgomery County (legible copy of driver's license, deed, or passport).

Co-authors must meet the same requirements.

Both features and TV pilots are eligible.

5. Notifications

- Applicants will be contacted based on the status of their screenplay. Communication will be made through email.
- Applicants are encouraged to subscribe to the Greater Philadelphia Film Office (GPFO) Newsletter for competition updates here.

6. Consideration & Awards

- Submitted screenplays will be considered for all prizes for which they are eligible.
- Awards are based solely on the overall merit of entries, as determined by the judges.
- Prizes may not be granted if entries fail to meet the required standard.
- All applicants are encouraged to register their work with the <u>Writers Guild of America (East or West)</u> (Creates a dated record of a writer's claim to authorship) or the <u>U.S. Copyright Office</u> (Confers legal ownership and protects the expression of an idea).

7. Additional Rules & Terms

- **Confidentiality:** Judges and readers are instructed to treat submissions as confidential; however, applicants acknowledge that similarities in theme, story, or concept may occur and that no liability is assumed by the Competition or its affiliates.
- **Refunds:** No refunds will be issued under any circumstances, including disqualification, withdrawal, or failure to meet submission requirements.
- **Disqualification:** Submissions may be disqualified if they:
 - Fail to meet formatting or page count requirements.
 - o Contain author-identifying information on the title page.
 - o Include plagiarized, defamatory, or unlawful material.
- **Publicity:** By entering, applicants grant permission for their name, headshot, bio, title, and logline to be used in press releases, social media, and promotional materials if selected as a finalist or winner.

7. Additional Rules & Terms con't

- Liability: The Competition is not responsible for technical issues, data loss, corrupted files, or failed uploads.
- Taxes: Prize winners are solely responsible for payment of any applicable local, state, or federal taxes.
- **Co-Authors:** In the case of multiple authors, prizes and reimbursements will be divided equally, unless otherwise agreed to in writing by all authors. Only one award designation (certificate, trophy) will be provided.
- **Rights Retained:** Applicants retain all rights to their submitted work. The Competition will not option, produce, or exploit any submitted material.
- **Feedback:** The Competition has no obligation to provide notes, feedback, or comments. If feedback is provided, it is not guaranteed and does not reflect the opinions of the Competition.
